PALM SUNDAY SERVICES

Sunday, March 29, at 8:00 am and 9:45 am

Palm Sunday begins at 8:00 am with the Holy Eucharist. At 9:15 a.m. in Moseley Hall will be a gathering for the making of palm crosses. In Moseley Hall you'll be able to enjoy cross bus, juice and coffee. Maggie, the donkey, will be located outside Moseley Hall to greet the children. Maggie will lead us into worship this morning.

The "10:00 am" service will begin EARLY at 9:45 am with the Blessing of the Palms and a procession of the congregation into the church. This procession recalls Jesus' entry into Jerusalem before his Passion. We will gather on the front lawn, near the stone sign. In the event of inclement weather, we will gather in Moseley Hall.

At 6:00 pm we will be hosting a community Lenten Meditations service combining choirs from the community. The scriptures for this service tell the story of Holy Week from Christ in the Garden through his Crucifixion and Burial of Christ. Hymns will be sung between each reading.

A Eucharist will be offered on Monday & Tuesday (March 30 and 31) at 5:30 pm in the Chapel.

TENEBRAE

Wednesday, April 1, at 7:30 pm

For centuries Tenebrae (Latin for "Darkness" or "Shadows") has been a name for night and early morning services of the last three days of Holy Week. By drawing from portions of each of these three offices and through music from Taize and spoken word, our service of Tenebrae will offer a meditation upon, and a prelude to, the events of our Lord's life between the Last Supper and His Resurrection.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

Thursday, April 2, at 7:00 pm

This service recalls the institution of the Last Supper and Jesus' humble act of washing his disciples' feet. It ends with the stripping of the altar and the beginning of a vigil throughout the night. Join us for a special time of prayer and meditation, inspired by the question asked of all of us by Jesus -"Could you not watch with me one hour?" This prayer vigil in the Chapel follows the Maundy Thursday liturgy and ends with communion at the 12:15 pm service on Good Friday. Parishioners are invited to sign up for the vigil.



GOOD FRIDAY

Friday, April 3, 12:15 pm

This service begins with silent prayer, homily, Solemn Collects, Veneration of the Cross and the Mass of the Pre-Sanctified gifts.

The Stations of the Cross will be offered in the church at 5:30 pm. This will end our Good Friday observance.

EASTER DAY

Sunday, April 5, at 8:00 am and 10:00 am

Easter morning begins at 8:00 am with a celebration of Holy Eucharist in the Chapel. The 10:00 am service is a Festal Holy Communion with full choir and all the glory of Easter Morning!

There is also an Easter Egg Hunt for children through the Third Grade following the 10:00 a.m. service. Children are asked to bring their Easter baskets for the hunt.

From the Rector - Father Michael Singer

It's hard to believe that more often than not, the clean water a developing community desperately needs is right underneath them. And it's amazing how a relatively small investment to get to it can make such a dramatic difference in so many lives.

Every day in rural communities and poor urban centers throughout sub-Saharan Africa, and other parts of the world, hundreds of millions of people suffer from a lack of access to clean, safe water.

Women and girls especially bear the burden of walking miles at a time to gather water from streams and ponds - full of water-borne disease that is making them and their families sick.

Illness from drinking dirty water and the time lost fetching it robs entire communities of their futures.

Hope is put on hold in over half of the developing world's primary schools without access to water and sanitation.

Education is critical for breaking the cycle of poverty and yet over half of the world's schools lack access to safe water and sanitation facilities.

Lack of clean water has serious effects on student's academic performance and

attendance rates. The lack of safe water can cause even the best students to lose momentum as they deal with stomach pains and diarrhea from disease and hunger.

For girls, the situation is especially troublesome. If schools do not have proper toilets, girls drop out once they reach puberty. Further, it is typically the responsibility of the women to fetch water thus limiting their access to both education and business opportunities. Think about it: everyday, women and young girls carry more than 40 pounds of dirty water from sources over 4 miles away from their homes. This leaves little time for education which is critical to changing the long term prospects of developing nations.

Relieving **hunger** in Africa has to begin with access to clean water. It may seem simple, but we forget that without access to a reliable source of water, food is hard to grow and even more difficult to preserve and prepare.

It takes huge amounts of water to grow food. Just think, globally we use 70% of our water sources for

agriculture and irrigation, and only 10% on domestic uses.

A small investment in a clean, safe source of water can have a huge impact on both crop production and the nutrition of a community. In fact, one of the most encouraging things when new wells, with clean safe water are established is the many small gardens that have popped up.

Good **health** begins with access to clean water. Every day, nearly 1,600 children die from diarrhea caused by contaminated water, poor sanitation, and improper hygiene –more than AIDS and malaria combined.

Did you know that half of the world's hospital beds are filled with people suffering from a water

related disease? In developing countries, about 80% of illnesses are linked to poor water and sanitation conditions. 1 out of every 5 deaths under the age of 5 worldwide is due to a waterrelated disease. Clean and safe water is essential to healthy living.

Tiny worms and bacteria live in water naturally. Most of the bacteria are pretty harmless. But some of them can cause devastating disease in humans.

And since they can't be seen, they can't be avoided. Every glass of dirty water is a potential killer.

There are a number of reasons why **poverty** has become an epidemic in Africa. Poverty can be the result of political instability, ethnic conflicts, climate change and other man-made causes.

But one of the greatest causes of poverty in Africa is also the most overlooked...the lack of access to clean drinking water.

Nearly one billion people do not have access to clean, safe water - that's the equivalent of 1 in 8 people on the planet!

For these people, poverty is a fact of life. The good news... This is a *solvable* problem. During the season of Lent we will be collecting coins *(along with bills and checks)* in a bucket in the Narthex. All churches in the diocese will be partnering with Episcopal Relief and Development and participating in a joint effort to bring safe, clean water to parts of the world where currently there is none. Please empty your pockets of coins on Sundays so that someone may have safe, clean water to drink.



Worship



A significant moment of Palm Sunday liturgy is the reading of the Passion Gospel, the Gospel appointed for Palm Sunday. It is the re-telling of the Gospel according to St. Mark regarding the tragic events of Jesus' suffering and how he was tragically rejected, unfairly condemned, viciously beaten, horribly insulted, and cruelly mistreated by multiple groups. At St. Mary's it is the tradition to read the Gospel in many parts, of those who were there. Choir and Psalm

As we head into Lent, our liturgies change. For starters, the Gloria is not sung during Lent. In its place, we will sing a setting of the Trisagion composed by Fernando Ortega. During Lent, we also bring back the Agnus Dei, better known as the Lamb of God. We generally omit this part of the liturgy during the year.

We will also be offering a short Evensong service on Wednesday nights beginning at 5:30 p.m. and will be moving our Adult Choir rehearsals to 7:15 p.m. on Wednesday nights.

At our Sunday morning Eucharist, we will reintroduce Psalm singing through various styles from the familiar hymn tune antiphon we used during Advent to Gregorian Psalm tones.

Mission trip to the Dominican Republic

Ever thought of going on a mission trip? Again this year members of St. Mary's will return to the village of Mosovi in the Dominican Republic to continue of relationship with the people of this small



village. While there we will offer Vacation Bible School, paint the church, repair the roof, and work to get clean drinking water to the village.
